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

President's Column



National Champion Champions The ACC records three different ways to earn points: Grass Roots

Rating Points (GRPs), Internet Rating Points (IRPs), and Master Rating Points (MRPs).

The Grass Roots season consists of thirty-six weeks of play, plus the Regional and National tournaments (both eighteen games). With two divisions, clubs either play nine games (Division 1) or six games (Division 4) each week. Club players in Division 1 must score twelve points or more to earn GRPs that week, and six or more players must be present. Players in Division 4 must earn eight points or more that week and have four members present. At the regional and national tournament all cards with 24 or more points earn GRPs. The ACC awards the top player in each division as well as the highest batting average. Club champions are presented a certificate.

Congratulations to Division 1 Grass Roots national champion **Thomas Beucler** (Club 388 in Northfield MN, with 374 GRPs). and to Division 4 national champion **Brad Seger** (Club 39 in Pasco WA, with 279 GRPs). **Tom Highshoe** was the batting average champion with a 76.3% winning average. Tom passed away earlier this year; after fifteen weeks he had 215 points and was champion at Club 55.

Players can earn Internet Rating Points two ways: (1) Grass Roots-style ninegame tournaments on **ecribbage.com**, where you must score twelve or more points; and (2) bracket tournaments on **gamecolony.com**, where you must advance into the third round of play to earn IRPs. Players can play up to 150 tournaments a year. The ACC recognizes the top player as internet champion and the top ten players with a certificate announcing them as internet All Americans. Congratulations to **Daniel Crete** (*dec*), the 2023 internet national champion with 1,382 IRPs.

Players earn Master Rating Points at sanctioned tournaments in either main or consolation tournaments; the top 25% of entrants advance to the playoffs. Points are earned during qualifier rounds and during each round advanced in playoffs. The season is from August 1 through July 31. Congratulations to **Bob Bartosh**, who with 2,316 MRPs is the 2023 MRP national champion!

The 2023–24 season is here, and all scores have been reset to 0. I wish you good luck, safe travels, and fun fair play! I hope to congratulate you next year on *your* national championship.

front cover—**COMPOSED IN ALL CAPS, TO MAKE SURE YOU KNOW IT IS IMPORT-ANT!**—announced that the second annual Tournament of Champions would be held in Las Vegas on Veterans Day weekend with an entry fee of \$100. If this fee had kept pace with inflation, today's TOC would cost \$302!

25 Years Ago

The cover announced **Bernard Whitfield** (Raleigh NC) as winner of the twenty-fifth National Open, edging out **Jeff Raynes** (Cary NC) in the finals. On page 5, we learn that for the first and only time (so far) in ACC history, there was a tie for national champion. Both **Paul Hatcher** (Salem OR) and **DeLynn Colvert** (Missoula MT) finished the season with 1,331 MRPs.



Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

I first played the National Open Cribbage Tournament in 2004. It immediately became—and remains—my favorite cribbage tournament of all time.

But despite having "**win National Open Cribbage Tournament**" on my cribbage bucket list all these years, I've never done terribly well in the NOCT main. In eighteen attempts, I have yet to "play on Monday"—meaning I've never been in the final six grouping. But I continue to go back year after year because this tournament provides, hands down, the most fun you can have with a wooden object poked full of holes.

Since 2009 (when I started tracking my batting average), my overall record at all events in the NOCT cluster—including Come Monday since 2010 and Open Opener since 2013—is 54% (564–481). I was proud to earn my Master Rating there in 2009, and I've been lucky enough to win two satellites there (the 2005 Sunday Special and



the 2018 High Roller).

This year provided yet another unique cribbage experience. After a bye, my first opponent was **James "Zip" Foley** (San Antonio TX). Zip—who according to **Frank Abernathy** got his nickname because that's what he did: he zipped around the board—won the National Open in 1977, the second year the tourney was held. He was stationed nearby in the military, so he played NOCT until he was transferred to Texas. Zip dropped out of the ACC for decades but recently returned to the fold and made his first trip to the National Open since 1987! I was initially puzzled when I looked at Zip's record because it says he

has no MRPs. Wait, what? How can he be at zero MRPs with a tournament win under his belt? Oh, that's right. The ACC wasn't even formed when Zip won the 1977 tourney. I was lucky to zip past Zip with a 4–0 run.

While my first opponent was the longest-ago NOCT

champion, my second opponent was the reigning NOCT champion: **Lana Newhouse**, → who won just last year. I've known Lana for years, and we always enjoy playing. This time I enjoyed it a bit more, slipping past the 2022 champ with an 8–4 score.



Then, another improbable occurrence pitted me against a third consecutive former champion: **Rick Bryant**, **(** who captured the NOCT crown in 2005. Rick won the first game, I won the next three, but then a skunk and a loss did me in.

Interestingly enough, I had a shot at playing a fourth former champion. But, alas, both **Frank Reddy** (who won NOCT twice—in 2003 and 2015) and I lost in the same round and then petered out in the once-defeated bracket, so that was not to be.

So with **win National Open Cribbage Tournament** still not checked off my bucket list, you can be sure I'll return to Durham (aka "The New Raleigh") in 2024 to take another shot at the National Open title. In the meantime, join me in celebrating the new NOCT champion: Terry Cushman (story on page 12).

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros •••••• •••••• •••••• ••••••

Here is one hand that I debate how to play correctly. It's your crib with A-2-4-5-8-Q, so do you keep 2-5-8-Q or A-2-4-8? It would appear on the surface that A-2-4-8 is a better pegging hand, but in my eyes the three-card "magic eleven" as dealer is counter-productive, since you usually have to use a third extra card to get 31-2. In my thinking, the three-card "magic eleven" has its greatest value if it ends in you pairing your own card, such as A-A-9, 3-4-4, 2-2-7, or 3-3-5. On the other hand, tossing 5-Q to the crib is likely to outscore A-4 but not by a wide margin.

I'm pretty sure many players hold this hand the other way, so try to convince me your way is the better way. I'm always receptive to different ways to play hands.

As for last month's column detailing my nightmares with middle cards as pone, a few people wrote me to say there was nothing I could do. I appreciate the empathy!

Shana Coffey (Eau Claire) Steve Schneider (Appleton) he race for national champion and the push to make the All American Team is over. At the close of the cribbage season at midnight on July 31, all the moving numbers and names on the leader board stood motionless for the only time this year.

We always see some of the ACC's best on the All American Team every season, and we are not disappointed in this expectation this year. At #4 is Life Master $(4\star)$ Erik Locke (Wood Village OR), clocking in with his fifteenth All American accolade. And the 2023 national champion is Life Master $(3\star)$ Bob Bartosh (Sacramento CA). Bob has made the All American Team ten prior times, but as they say, "eleventh time is a charm." With leap year soon upon us, Bob gets a bonus day and will be celebrated for the next 366 days as reigning ACC champion!

These two frequent flyers were joined by four other All Americans who have won two, three, or four AAT berths. But it was especially exciting this year to see an amazing *five* first-timers on the AAT:

- Life Master (*) Robert Chase (Minneapolis MN) — #3
- Life Master **Betty Brumley** (Roseburg OR) — #5
- Life Master **Bob Brumley** (Roseburg OR) — #6
- Master **David Aiello** (Kenosha WI) — #8
- Life Master James Clark (Livermore CA) — #10

The Western Region filled six spots on the AAT, the Central Region had four spots, while the Eastern Region had only one spot.

2023 All American Team

The annual All American team consists of the top ten MRP-generating players nationally plus the top MRP earner in any region not otherwise represented. For only the second time since this policy was enacted in 2013, this year's All American team will consist of eleven players. On the strength of her strong play throughout all three regions this season, Master **Charlene Cohen** (North Anson ME) captured the Eastern Region championship and earned the eleventh spot on the 2023 All American Team.

Five states are represented on this year's All American Team. Top dog here was **Oregon**, with four slots, followed closely by **Wisconsin** (three slots). California had two, while Minnesota and Maine had one each.

CW congratulates all of the AAT members and looks forward to seeing them at Grand National 41 in Virginia Beach!

Central Region Heat

Hot Terry At Marinette the first weekend in May, the main tournament was won by Terry Weber. → This started a remarkable run in which he won four main tournaments within an eleven-week period. He also did a double-double: twice he won two mains in consecutive weeks. And during this eleven-week stretch Terry even qualified for five other mains (including two quarterfinal finishes)! Three consolation playoffs were also involved. In the last three months of the season, Terry totaled 891 MRPs, which propelled him to his third All American ranking.



Hot Bob One of the highlights of Bob Chase's season was playing his great friend Vince Conley in a Topaz main final in March. ↓ They have known each other for over fifty years, meeting through another common interest—bowling. Vince plays only a couple tournaments a year, so competing against Bob in a finals match was quite serendipitous. Bob prevailed in a close match of four games. Bob also played against another good friend, Les Kvien, in two consolation finals within a four-week period. Les and Bob both originally hail from Minnesota; they first met when Bob joined the ACC in 1997. Indicative of Bob's superlative season, he eked out wins in both events. (But Les also had a very solid campaign as well.) The only other season Bob played a significant number of tournaments was 2000, when he finished #11 in the country. This year Bob ended up with seven wins (five mains and two consolations), and was #2 in the Central Region and #3 in the country, earning his All American ranking.



he 48th National Open Cribbage Tournament the oldest of all cribbage tournaments and the grandfather of the ACC—was held on the last weekend of July, yea, on the last weekend of the 2022– 23 cribbage season.

National Open

Attendance was up, with the highest number since 2015. Enthusiasm soared, as players enjoyed both the second year at a new facility and the second year after Covid created a two-year gap in this long-running tourney, stretching back to 1974—before the ACC was even founded. And when the last deck of cards was put back in its box, only one player achieved the tournament-long goal of avoiding two match losses. The 48th NOCT champion is **Terrance Cushman Jr.**



An ACC member since 2003, Terry (who turned forty on July 15) hails from Conway SC (right next to Myrtle Beach), although you wouldn't know this on the basis of his official NOCT name badge. In addition, because of his longtime residence in Maine—and because of northeastern dominance during the National Open weekend— New England quickly reclaimed Terry as one of their own.

Exactly how good did New England do? Well, here is list of the winners of the NOCT weekend. Notice carefully where they reside (or used to reside):

But back to the player who

changed his state tree from pine to palmetto.

In December 2021, Terry and his girlfriend packed everything they owned into a fifteen-foot U-Haul and pointed south. Prior to this move, Terry had always used his vacation time to travel to Grand National. But now living only three hours from Raleigh, he finally played the National Open.

His first attempt was 2022, and it was brief. He was immediately eliminated from the undefeated bracket by **David Lambeth**. And then **Jacob French** tossed him out of the once-defeated bracket.

[Editor's note—for those players who have ever said something like this about the National Open: "I don't like the format, because you can lose two matches and be done"—read on.]

Terry salvaged the 2022 weekend by winning the NOCT consy on Sunday for his ninth win. And then he won the Come Monday main the very next day for his tenth win!

That was by far the best weekend of Terry's entire ACC career, and it seemed reasonable to believe he would never top that. Well, until this year—when he won the National Open main!

Terry says he spent his first twelve years in the ACC playing too much defense and—his words—"being extremely fundamentally flawed." After all that time of not self-evaluating, not listening to the advice of more advanced players, he finally tore his game down and focused on improving it. His strategy obviously paid off!

Terry writes: "There's no other tournament like the National Open. The atmosphere is different. The schedule of play is unique. If you're unfortunate enough to end up in the once-defeated bracket early, it's a constant grind. If you stay in the undefeated bracket, you have a lot more downtime, which is extremely advantageous. The deeper you go into the brackets, the more emotionally invested continued on next page

you become."

The key to winning the NOCT is avoiding a skunk in your match. Again quoting Terry: "That a skunk essentially counts as two wins adds a level of anxiety. If you're way behind, you can't just go through the

or your path to winning becomes much more difficult."

Getting hot at the right time doesn't hurt either! For example, in both matches against **Da**vid Statz, Terry was behind 3–1 and had to rally and sweep games five, six, and seven to win. That worked, and then he again faced the only undefeated player in the tournament: **Kristy Haught** (Rocky Mount NC).

Kristy had given Terry his only match loss so far, so when they were the last two players left, that meant he had to beat her twice—and twice he did!

After 10 matches, after 50 games (combined record 34–16), after 55 hours since 170 players started the NOCT, Terry was the only 1 who had not lost two matches. Terry is your 2023 NOCT champ!

Terry's geographically challenged NOCT name badge. For the record, he lives in Conway, <u>South</u> Carolina.





Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Read the Rulebook

Another cribbage season has ended, and I along with 169 others attended the National Open Cribbage Tournament in Durham NC. This legacy event is the birthplace of the ACC. It predates the formation of the ACC by seven years and features a double-elimination format the only tournament of its kind in the country—with the finals being held on Monday afternoon.

Since I didn't make the finals, I was playing in the Come Monday twelvegame main event—the last chance to earn Master Rating Points for this season. I was the head judge at this event.

The folks playing to my right raised their hands and called for a judge. As head judge, I cannot respond unless called as a third judge. A very prominent senior judge was passing by and stopped to assist. The players explained that the dealer placed the deck on the wrong side of the board and both players threw to the crib on the wrong side as well. The starter card had been cut but nobody had yet played a card.

This senior judge promptly told them to play on, because the starter card had been turned and the individual that ended up as pone this time would deal next time. They did not wait until a second Judge arrived, nor was a rulebook opened. The players accepted his ruling.

After I moved over to play that person I was asked about the ruling. I didn't know the answer off the top of my head so I consulted the rulebook. Rule 5.1.d states: If all four cards are discovered to be on the pone's side, they shall be moved to the dealer's side, without exposure, unless the starter card has been turned and each player has played at least one card.

This is why we preach over and over again: **read the rule from the rulebook**. Don't think you know it all. As judges we owe it to the ACC membership and the Rules Committee (which spent years developing the rulebook) to get our rulings correct. And this is another reason why you should wait for a second judge to arrive—two heads are better than one—and maybe this wouldn't have been a blown call.

Finally, if you find yourself in a situation that just doesn't seem right, call for the head judge. I take that job very seriously. It is the head judge's responsibility to make sure things are done right.

Canadian Doubles Rules

Canadian Doubles joined the ACC metaverse when the first CD satellite—directed by **David Aiken**—was played in Raleigh in July 2016. Since then, CD has become an integral part of a tournament weekend.

We have worked out many of the logistical issues for running a CD tourney: cutting for deal, rotation, and so on. But some rules in the ACC rulebook need to be tweaked for CD.

For example, the too-many-too-few rule in our current rulebook is the very model of logicality for singles play, but doesn't work for doubles. Or, how long does the dealer have to take two points for the Jack—until her partner plays their first card, or until the dealer plays her first card? And what happens if the hand-setter splits the hands, but forgets to give one of the hands to their partner before the starter card is turned? How do you deal with a renege in doubles?

We are both happy and sad as the cruise—and the ATW competition—ends. Sad the trip is over, but happy we will see our ACC family again.




