Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all of you and may health, happiness and good cards follow you thru the year! Bob Madsen, Secretary of the A.C.C.

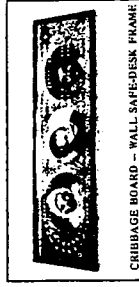


ST. ANDREW CRIBBAGE TOURNAMENT  
SEPT. 23, 1984 NEW BRITAIN, CT

Fifty participants ranging in age from teens to 92 gathered at St. Andrew's church hall for this second annual event. Tourney director, Alan Victor reports that the most exciting match was the final one played by Richard Clukey, Sr. from Thomaston, CT and Harry Palmer from W. Springfield, MA. Playing was tough down to the fifth and deciding game which came down to each player needing 1 point to claim the championship. Tension was high as Richard had to decide which card to play, a 2 or a 3. He chose the 3, Harry played a 9 and Richard was able to double up for 2 pts. and the championship! Had Richard played the 2 Harry would have been able to double it and the decision would have gone the other way. Third place winner was Rob Odentz from Springfield, MA over David Bartman of Avon, CT in fourth.

The consolation tournament was won by Jeff Stenner of New Britain in a close contest with runner-up John Chambers from Esmond, RI. 3rd and 4th were taken by Ed Zigas also of New Britain and Al Lefebvre of Warwick, RI, respectively.

The morning qualifying round held great excitement as Herbert Brennan of Torrington, CT scored a 28 hand, his first in 30 years of playing cribbage.

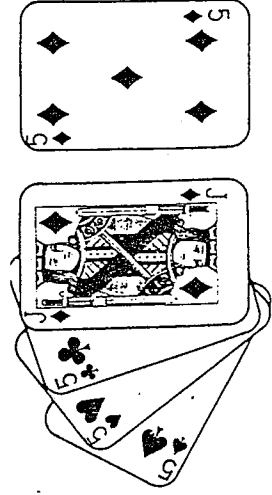

# Belle City Cribbage Classic



The BELLE CITY CRIBBAGE CLASSIC will be held on January 12 & 13, 1985 at the CLAYTON HOUSE MOTEL, 5005 WASHINGTON AVE (HY-20), RACINE, WISCONSIN. This tournament is sanctioned by the American Cribbage Congress and is open to anyone 18 years of age or older. National rating points will be awarded. Entries will be limited to the first 264 received.

Registration begins at 7:00 AM Saturday. Orientation and presentation of rules with a question and answer period at 8:00 AM. The tournament begins PROMPTLY at 8:30 AM. All players will play 2 games against 12 opponents for a total of 24 games on Saturday. Qualifiers from Saturday's round play in a single elimination, best of 5, on Sunday to determine the tournament winners. The number of qualifiers for Sunday's finals will not exceed 64, and will be determined by the number of entries. There will be a consolation tournament on Sunday for those players not qualifying for Sunday's finals and those eliminated in the first round of play in the championship round. This tournament will start at approximately 10:30 AM Sunday. Entry fee is \$15.00 including \$5.00 toward "Q" pool for this tournament.

The entry fee for non ACC Members is \$36.00 and \$31.00 for members. There will be an optional \$10.00 "Q" pool for Saturday's qualifying round. The "Q" pool prizes will be graduated. Checks received without the properly filled form will be returned. The committee will do its best to keep expenses down and guarantees 85% return of the entry fee in the championship tournament as well as all "Q" pools. At this point and time the committee feels it will be able to return 90% or better.

The organizers cannot guarantee not having to play a friend or spouse, though every effort will be made to do so. If you are seated at a table with a friend or spouse, we will try to make other arrangements, but once play has been started, NO CHANGES WILL BE MADE. A special no smoking area has been set aside. If you wish to play in this area, please check the box on the entry form.

The Clayton House Motel has set aside a block of rooms at the rate of \$29.00 for a single and \$37.00 for a double, per night. If you make reservations by phone, you must mention that you are playing in the Belle City Cribbage Tournament. The number to call is: 1-414-637-7911. If you plan to fly in, call one of the tournament directors and arrangements will be made to pick you up from the airport in Milwaukee.

The Clayton House is located on HY 20, on the west side of Racine. Traveling on I-94, take the HY 20 exit and travel east on HY 20. The motel is approximately 5 miles from I-94 and is located two blocks east of HY 31 on the south side of the street. The motel features a lounge with live entertainment and an indoor swimming pool. Also for your convenience, there are several restaurants nearby as well as a cinema and two shopping centers. Morning coffee and rolls will be available.

There will be a Friday Night Earlybird and a Saturday Special both starting at 8:00 PM.
