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With summer nearing an end, very soon all 170+ Grass Roots clubs across the United States and Canada will peg into action.

My Deal by David Aiken

The start of the official Grass Roots season on September 1 is a cause for both rejoicing and consternation. Self-acknowledged cribbage geeks (like me) can hardly wait until the cards hit the table. Here's our chance to defend a title, improve our game, and see cribbage friends every week while playing the world's greatest card game.

Given all these benefits of playing in a Grass Roots club, why then am I hesitant about the start of the new season? I am worried that the next guest to walk in the door won't join our club and the ACC.

I'll grant you that tournament cribbage is not for everyone. Even though I'm happy whenever I meet anyone who loves this game, I'm not naïve enough to think that every cribbage player will want to join the ACC.

That said, I do have a tendency to take it personally when someone finds out about our club, makes the effort to show up on Tuesday, plays the evening with us—and then walks out the door never to be seen again. Since my club is not alone in this regard (see the Stat of the Month on page 8), please allow me to think aloud about the problem of attracting—but not retaining—new players.

In my thinking, the single, most important thing we can do to solve the retention problem is for established club members to welcome the new folks. When you spot someone new, introduce yourself, find out their name, answer their questions, and then introduce your new friend to one or two other members.

Let's make it a point not to overwhelm guests with rules. Tournament cribbage has a lot of rules and penalties that we cannot expect new players to know on their first few nights. There's a right way and a wrong way to introduce the concept of cutting before the deal. There's a right way and a wrong way to tell them not to look at their discards after they hit the table.

I strongly believe that *no penalties* should be applied to new players during their official two-week initiation period. If they pick up their front peg, let them put it back. If they peg backward, let them reset their pegs and then record their score in the right direction. If they renege, then replay the pegging sequence and let them play the card at the right time with no penalty. If they can't come up with the right total for a tricky hand, then help them count it.

And it's definitely not a good idea to tell new players that they misplayed a hand even if it is patently obvious. People play cribbage for a variety of reasons, and some guests may simply want to be part of a social club without being bothered by questions of strategy. If they want to take their game to the next level, questions about how to hold or peg a hand will naturally arise in the course of time.

#### **Tournament Tidbits**

That's A Go! Needing 14 points to win an early qualifying game against Paul Mauel (Appleton WI), Master Ruth Zimmerman (Green Bay WI) held A-A-2-2. Sugar! The cut card was a 7, so when Paul paired her Ace lead, Ruth naturally had to take the six points to give her a shot at winning. Oops! Paul had the case Ace and scored 12 points. Suddenly things looked brighter, however, when Paul paired her Deuce. With this second triple, Ruth would now have enough points to win the game when she counted her hand. Double sugar! Paul had the case Deuce, and he won the game by pegging out from hole 97! Ruth got the last laugh, however: she won the tournament.

Nugget Classic Twenty-four of the top fifty players in the Western Region played in Paradise CA at the end of May.

Capital City Cribbage #1 The mid-June floodwaters in Des Moines could not quench the hottest player in Iowa: Grand Master John Syftestad (Mount Horeb WI). On Friday night, he won eight games and took first place; in the main, he won seventeen games and was high qualifier; on Saturday night, he won seven games and—yet again—took first place. Needless to say, John also won first place in All Events, with 68 points. After winning 80% of his games in these three events (32 of 40 games), John finally ran out of gas on Sunday when he lost to Life

Medford Lion's Tale #1 Life Master Erik "The Hammer" Locke (Portland OR) had an astounding weekend: he qualified with a 32-GP scorecard and went on to win his sixth main of this season. He picked up 177 MRPs and is now averaging 224 MRPs monthly. With 2,395 MRPs on the year, Erik is a scant 82 points away from the season record of 2,477 MRPs set by Life Master (\*\*\*) Duane Toll (Sutherlin OR) in 2006.

Medford Lion's Tale #2 After directing tournaments for eleven years, Herschel and Rickie Mack (McKinleyville CA) finally had someone get a sanctioned 29hand in one of their tournaments. On June 21 Master Bruce Pomeroy (Middleton ID) was more than happy to take this monkey off their back.

Spring U.S. Open Kerry O'Connell (Ventura CA) won her very first MRPs in West Covina CA a few years back and on June 22 returned to the scene of the crime to capture her Master ranking.

Schaefer Shuffle He almost decided to go fishing, but at the last minute Kevin McCabe (Milwaukee WI) decided to play cribbage on his 38th birthday—and he ended up shooting his age: he scored 38 GPs and was high qualifier. How's that for a nice birthday present!

than you do. That's okay; you can work on their speed after they join the club. We all know the formula: 9 games x 15 minutes =  $2\frac{1}{4}$  hours—which means that with a 7:00 p.m. start time you can hit the road by 9:15 sharp. But is it really all that bad if you don't walk away until 9:37, or 10:03? Don't think of it as losing thirty minutes; think of it as promoting the game and making new players feel comfortable.

Finally, many new players are overwhelmed by "all that cribbage." For those club members on hand, you can then play five or six games at a relaxed pace as a way to introduce guests to ACC-style play. A reduced summer schedule (every other week, for example, or seven games a session) can accomplish the same thing.

All of this has one purpose in mind: to make it as easy as possible for guests to feel comfortable with your club while learning the ropes. More importantly, everything you do should be geared to make your guests want to come back. There is

of us who routinely play twenty-twogame qualifying rounds at weekend tournaments, who enter long matches that last thirty or forty games, who can whip through six or seven games in an hour for us, playing nine games is a snap.

And to be honest, there's not a lot you can do about the nine-games-a-week, thirty-six-sessions-a-year Grass Roots format. This arrangement has obvious advantages, and it is understandable that thousands of ACC members enjoy it week in, week out, year after year. To help assimilate new players, your club could hold an extra (unofficial) session on an off-night. Invite all recent newcomers, lurkers, or semiinterested players for a social night. With several of your friendlier, more outgoing no doubt that visiting a club full of master cribbage players can be a daunting experience, but it shouldn't be off-putting.

Let me put it another way: there are more important things in Grass Roots play than enforcing a two-point penalty for reneging, than winning a game, than finishing the session in exactly 135 minutes. There is a hierarchy of priorities at work here, and the #1 goal of the Grass Roots organization is to promote cribbage for its entertainment and education values. If we sometimes have to sacrifice personal goals for the good of the game, then so be it.

Bill credits the late Leo Horigan for mentoring him, and Bill has returned the favor to new players on the tournament circuit. Club champion five times (so far), Bill has twenty tournament championships to his credit (so far).

One might assume from Doug's quiet demeanor that he's a cribbage wimp, but you would make this mistake only once. Since joining the ACC in 1991, he's won eleven tournaments, been club champion twice, achieved his Bronze ranking, and now adds a

star to his lofty Life Master rating. Just how lethal is Doug? Well, he once won twentyfive games in a row: two grand slams in two different Grass Roots clubs and then the first

seven games of a Friday satellite event. In all, he has had eight grand slams (including an impressive 23/9 +275), and he was high qualifier in Reno with 42 points six years ago. (The scorecards on page 10 of this issue show his ability to turn up the heat.) Doug happily reports that "cribbage has been a very enjoyable part of his retirement." He and Ethel Sherwan travel a lot, and quite often they work in a cribbage tournament with their travels.

## **TOC** Invitation Criteria

Can't wait for your TOC invitation to show up in the mail? If you have met at least one of the criteria listed below, then you have qualified to play in this invitation-only event and can begin to make your travel arrangements. All criteria apply to the cribbage season ending on July 31, 2008.

If you earn a one-year invitation more than one way (e.g., you are club champion and winner of a sanctioned event), you cannot split them up to provide multiple invitations stretched over consecutive years. After a one-year invitation is used—even if you met multiple one-year criteria—then you have to requalify the next year.

The one-year criteria marked with an asterisk (\*) have a three-year option; that is, if you receive an invitation on the basis of an asterisked criterion, you may use it in 2009, 2010, or 2011. Once used, however, the invitation expires, and you must requalify in subsequent years.

Two other requirements must be met in order to play in the TOC: (1) you must be an ACC member, and (2) you must be age 21 by February 6, 2009 (a deferment is available if you are not 21 by this date).

- winner of a sanctioned event (main or consolation)
- anyone with as many MRPs as the 50th-rated player in a region
- Grass Roots club champion\*



#### Luther Lord's Really Cool Scorecard

We wanted to print this scorecard from the Spring U.S. Open, but the only place we could find for it was here—on it's side. But maybe that's appropriate, given the heavy scores in the left column! It's not quite an ACC record, but pretty damn impressive, nonetheless.





It is time to close the saga of the five-card blank hands. How many blank hands are there? *Only* 220 combinations of five cards (ignoring suit) yield a 19-hand. Given that there are 6,175 total numerical combinations of five cards (again ignoring suit), that's not bad: you will get a blank hand only 3.5% of the time—right?!

As far as CW can tell, William H. Green's Key to Cribbage (1882) was the first book to enumerate all 220 blank hands. While this book is hard to find (even in a reprint edition), it is included in its entirety as an appendix to ACC founder Joseph Petrus Wergin's How to Win at Cribbage (1980).

Just in case you want to know what hands to avoid, a complete list of all 220 of those nasty zero hands may be found in the nearby box. **Norm Nikodym** points out an interesting factoid: all blank hands contain at least one 10 or face card. Therefore, if you hold four cards all lower than 10 and the starter is also lower than 10, you will have at least two points.

Which card appears most frequently in these 220 blank hands? The King is king of the blank hand, with 129 appearances, followed by these lesser cards:

(A-4 or 2-3) contains points. Thus we can't have a 5, and we can have only one of A or 4 and only one of 2 or 3. With two cards out of A through 5, we would need to hold six cards out of 6 through K. The only way to do that without making any runs would be 6-7-9-

10-Q-K. However, this forces us to hold 6-9, which is a 15-2. Thus no eight-card combination has zero points."

#### Best Cribbage Club in Michigan

They did it again! For the third time in four years, the Cereal City Cribbage Club (#300) won the Michigan All Star Tournament. The wining team—composed of club director **David Gerke**, **George Tanksley**, **Bob Cook**, and **Gary Reichel**—successfully defended its 2007 title. It previously won the MAST title in 2005.

Thirty-two players from eight Michigan Grass Roots clubs gathered in Grand Rapids on July 12 to compete in the fourth annual in-state competition. According to tournament director **David Aiken**, All Star teams are composed of the best players from each Grass Roots club throughout Michigan, based on their win percentage in weekly play during the 2007–2008 season. This annual tournament generates much enthusiasm throughout the year, as players in each club jockey for the coveted slots on their All Star team.

Ruthie Tiesma (Kalamazoo) posted top score in this year's 28-game tourney: 40/19 +220. She was followed closely by Mark Van Dyke (Muskegon) with 38/18 and Bob Cook (Battle Creek) with 38/16.

In the closest finish in the history of this event, only seven wins separated the top and bottom teams. Battle Creek won 59 of their 112 games (130 GPs)—only three games above .500 (52.8%)—while the last-place team won 52 games.

Muskegon #229 (who won the title in 2006) took second place. Other participating clubs were Grand Rapids #71, Grand Rapids #91, Rochester Hills #295, Kalamazoo #321, Mt. Pleasant #329, and Jackson #332.



andcrafted cribbage boards are frequently made from ivory, horn, and bone. The elephant ivory board pictured here (top) was made in Hong Kong or Japan; most of these boards were sold to GIs who were in Japan following World War II. The walrus ivory board is Native Alaskan scrimshaw. Both types of ivory board are highly valued by cribbage board collectors since there is a limited supply. Other types of ivory come from prehistoric mammoths, whale teeth, warthogs, and elk (the top two canine teeth). Elephant and walrus ivory tusk has many restrictions on its sale and import (for information about the legal restrictions on ivory, go to boonetrading. com, the website of the Boone Trading Co. of Brinnon WA).

To Tell or Not to Tell? That Is the Question Backward-Pegging Opponents



The ACC Rules Committee, under the able stewardship of Life Master Herschel Mack (McKinleyville CA), is in the process of considering rule revisions for a new edition of the ACC rule book. At the BOD meeting in February, several proposed changes were discussed by board members, with additional input from ACC members observing the meeting.

One of the most vigorously discussed issues was that of a player's response to an opponent pegging backward. The consensus seemed to be that it was inappropriate to create a rule requiring the non-peggingbackward (NPB) player to inform her opponent that he is pegging his score in reverse and to penalize the NPB player if she allowed that state of affairs to continue.

This would be an unenforceable rule, since it is not possible for two judges who arrive after the fact to ascertain at what moment the NPB player knew her opponent was harming himself. In addition, even if one assumes such knowledge was available, determining an appropriate penalty that could be applied to all such situations would be, to say the least, difficult.

It was proposed instead that a statement be included in the "Code of Ethics" section of the ACC rule book (currently page 5) to the effect that allowing an opponent to continue pegging backward is unethical. Many of those present at the meeting felt that this was an appropriate response to the perceived problem. But is it? Let's look at some the pros and cons of including this in the ACC Code of Ethics.

Proponents of including the statement point to the fact that the ACC is, first and foremost, an organization devoted to the friendly pursuit of a game we all enjoy playing. In that spirit, it is contradictory to allow an opponent to continue to take action that actually or potentially causes him to lose. Although we are competing, I want to win on my own merits (regardless of the much-debated skill/luck proportions thereof). The rule requiring a player to peg out when he has won the game was scrapped overwhelmingly because judges were being called and told, "My opponent won the game but he didn't peg out." Is pegging backward significantly different?

In addition, many in favor of inclusion pointed to ACC demographics: we have many members who are elderly, have vision problems, or are otherwise physically, mentally, or emotionally handicapped. Taking advantage of their disabilities is bullying-behavior that is antithetical to the aims and objectives of the ACC.

Last, proponents of including the statement note that the ACC is eagerly at-••• •••• ••• tempting to recruit and retain new •••• members. New players, over-•••• whelmed by rules of •••• •••• tournament play, •••• are more apt •••• ••••

••••  to make mistakes, including pegging backward, especially when they go around the end of a table. Promptly pointing out that they are pegging backward would not only reduce the number of such errors, but also would demonstrate to newbies that the ACC is, in fact, a friendly organization.

Opponents of including a statement about continuing to allow an opponent to peg backward also presented strong arguments. The ACC is devoted to friendly competition, but it is competition nonetheless. How responsible must one be for an opponent's errors? There is always a learning curve when someone tries something new, and tournament cribbage is no different: new players will always make more mistakes than seasoned ones, and players with disabilities, though not new, play ACC cribbage because they want to.

What about the relatively few occasions where the person pegging backward is drunk or high? Most rules are written with explicit acknowledgement that infractions are caused by error rather than mendacity: we speak of correcting irregularities, not of nailing cheaters. Should the accidental act of pegging backward be treated differently than inadvertently having too few or too many cards in the hand or the crib?

•••• Those against in-•••• •••• clusion that the note •••• Code of Ethics current •••• •••• speaks to behaviors ..... that are actively commit-•••• •••• ted by players. Since violations of this code can be grounds for suspension or expulsion, is it reasonable to punish someone for not doing something? Once again, we have the problem of not being able to get inside someone's head: how do judges know that you know your


opponent is pegging backward? Unless a player is injudicious enough to boast about it, we can only surmise what someone else knows. These suppositions are often in direct proportion to how much one dislikes the NPB player.

So what's the best course of action here? In my judgment, including a statement like "Continuing to allow an opponent to peg backward is unethical" is a mistake. It accomplishes nothing because it does not describe behavior that can be unequivocally interpreted and/or documented. Players who brag about encouraging opponents to peg backward could be subject to official sanction by means of the clauses that speak to "actions . . . unbecoming a member of the ACC" or "actions detrimental to the objectives of the ACC."

It is to be hoped, however, that each member •••• •••• considers what is his or •••• her primary reason for •••• •••• ACC membership. Most •••• members, in appropriate •••• ..... stances, are incircum-•••• clined to cut oppo-

..... •••• nents a little slack. In my •••• experience, it is far more common to see an NPB player tell her opponent that he has pegged backward than to allow that person to continue doing so. In these situations, each player must be responsible for her own standards of fairness and sportsmanship. The best intentions of this organization will never successfully legislate what is required to be a good person: all of us must decide who it is we want to see when we look in the mirror.


