ife Master (5*) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR)—the 2010 ACC national champion—is now also the 2010 Grand National champion!

Director **Jack Howsare** announced that nearly three hundred ACC members from around the country gath-

ered in Virginia Beach VA on September 17–19 to play the prestigious Grand National 29. When everyone started heading for the exits on late Sunday afternoon, Duane was the only undefeated player.

Duane joins four other GN champions who also have been national champion, but this is the first time in ACC history that the same player has worn both crowns at the same time:

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My Deal



I don't know that **Zach Nash**, a fourteenyear-old golf phenom, has ever played cribbage. But he can serve as a model of ethical and honorable behavior for cribbage players everywhere.

The words *honorable* and *ethical* are not used very often in today's society. Or if they are, it's with a knowing wink and a snicker of derision. But Zach proved himself worthy of both adjectives in refusing to bend the rules of golf.

On August 11, Zach won a golf invitational near his hometown in Wisconsin. Only later did he realize he inadvertently played the match with an illegal number of clubs in his bag. He hadn't used the extra club during the tourney, and his error didn't enhance his score. But the rules clearly state that a player can carry only fourteen clubs—not the fifteen that Zach discovered back in the clubhouse.

So what to do? Zach is, after all only a kid. What teenager wouldn't want to show off the first-place medal? Who wouldn't want to win a tourney at age fourteen? We really shouldn't expect him to tell anyone—right?

After some serious thought, "I just knew what I had to do," he said. So Zach called the tournament officials, told them what happened, and returned the medal.

In a win-at-any-cost world, golf seems to have a higher standard, demanding that competitors know every rule and call penalties on themselves. Is cribbage all that different than golf? Do we have different standards of conduct?

To help us think through this issue, ask yourself what you would do in these hypothetical scenarios:

- While shuffling the cards for the next deal, you glance down at your pegs: they are eleven holes apart, yet you clearly remember having only nine holes in the last hand. What would you do: call your opponent's attention to the error and move back to the correct hole, or figure that it's okay since the opponent should have caught your mistake?
- During a playoff match, you win the previous game and then, through force of habit, gather the cards, shuffle them, and begin dealing first in the next game.
 What would you do: hand the cards to your opponent, or continue to deal?
- You just hit a game-changing 28-hand, but when you start to take your next score, you accidentally pick up your front peg. What would you do: meekly record your new score from the peg left in the board, or—because you're playing a novice player—disingenuously say, "Oh, what do I do now?" in hopes that she will allow you to return your peg continued on page 12

investigate all possibilities. We found that any two cards in the crib can always be combined with the right other cards to make at least 14 points. But the 14-point total doesn't take into account possibilities eliminated by the cards you hold in your hand. If you hold the right cards in your hand, you can limit the crib liability to 12 points.

Erik Locke played Western Washington Limited in Poulsbo WA on September 11 and then flew from Seattle to Boston for the Daniel Webster Open in Nashua NH on September 12. Duane qualified and went a couple rounds in Poulsbo, but did not qualify in Nashua.

The next tourney was Pegging on the Tracks on September 14, and while cruising down the eastern seaboard aboard Amtrak, Duane lost his first eight games!

Duane also played Midweek Rush—and again did not qualify in the main. In the consolation he qualified and got knocked out in the second round.

Things got better once Duane played GN 29. He qualified #17 in the 293-player field with a 32/15 +200 scorecard. On his way to the championship, he earned a first-round bye and then beat . . .

Meanwhile, in the 192-player consolation, Grand Master Michael McCammon (Sparks NV) was high qualifier with a grand slam 20/9 +205. Mike waded through the field all the way to the finals before being waylaid by Master Charles

Barnes (Boca Raton FL) in the finals.

Chuck, who was the 2004 Grass Roots national champion, qualified in the main but got knocked out in time to enter and



win his sixth sanctioned tournament!

The day after GN 29, things returned to normal for Duane. He boarded Amtrak and played the northbound version of Pegging on the Tracks on his way to catch his flight out of Boston. He once again failed to qualify.

Sandy Stroup Wins GRTOC #5

The fifth annual Grass Roots Tournament of Champions was held on Friday, September 17, in conjunction with Grand National 29 at Virginia Beach VA. Directors David Aiken (Ada MI) and Andrea Lawrence (Torrance CA) report that this invitation-only tournament featured forty Grass Roots cribbage club champions from nineteen states.

At the conclusion of the twelve-game event, Sandra Stroup (Elgin IL)—the 2010 champion at Club 3 in Crystal Lake

IL—turned in the best scorecard: 19/9 +113. In second place was Roland Hall (Napa CA), following by Jim Hatch (Sa-

lem NH) and Mike Elkins (Rockledge FL). In addition to prize money, Stroup was also awarded a handsome trophy.

What 29-Hands? So what, really, was the likelihood of anyone getting a 29-hand at GN 29 in Virginia Beach VA on September 17–19 and claiming the \$2,900 pool? Let's do the math:

At an average of 9 deals per game, this means that there were 61,641 deals and 184,923 separate hands (counting cribs) Grand National, And since the chances of a 29-hand showing up are 1-in-216,580, then there was approximately an 85% chance of someone getting a 29-hand.

Through a covert un-

dercover investigation, however, CW has learned that you can throw all these calculations out the window, because of a previously unpublished factoid: GN director Jack Howsare has been directing ACC tournaments for fifteen years—and not once in all those fifteen years has any 29-hand showed up in any of Jack's tournaments. With this in mind, we should known that the chance of someone getting a 29-hand at GN 29 fell somewhere between slim and none!

Since there were no 29s, three 28-hands in sanctioned play on Saturday and Sunday split the money in the 29-hand pool. Congratulations to Life Master Bruce Sattler (Nottingham MD), Life Master (3 ★) **Bob Julian** (Franklin WI), and Life Master **Doug** Henderson (Racine WI) for recognizing that 5 + 5 + 5 + 5 + 10 = \$966!

Battle for the Bed Life Master (*) Phil Martin (Newington CT) and Mike Fetchel (Durham CT) roomed together at GN in a king suite. They agreed to play one game of cribbage every day to see who slept in the comfy bed that night—and who had to

to its original hole so you don't lose the 28 points?

 You desperately need a skunk to qualify for the playoffs when your opponent pegs backward. Hooray! If this happens one more time, you will likely get your skunk. What would you do: follow the code of ethics in the new rulebook and tell your opponent, or "not see" what is happening?

Perhaps at one time—say, prior to the release of the 2010 rulebook—a player might have understood that something was acceptable as long as it was not forbidden. It was perhaps on the far side of being unethical, but not illegal. But the new rulebook places more emphasis on fairness, and so while "help your opponent" may seem counterintuitive, it is in

the best interests of the ACC to promote fair play.

This does not mean that you have to help an opponent count their hand or allow them to take the extra points when they undercount. But I do know that the ACC as a whole would be better served if more of us showed—dare I say it—a little compassion to newer players. It really wouldn't hurt to say "keep looking" when a novice undercounts, or "take another look" when they overcount, or "be careful" when they start to falsely claim a game.

If it's true that cribbage is not just about winning but about the attitude we portray while we play, then I ask if cribbage should become like golf where players must call penalties on themselves. What do you think? I'd like to hear from you.



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The President's Column



One of the harshest penalties in the rule books is that for a false claim of game. I have had this penalty called against me once and only once. I was three points out, but thought I was only two points out. Poor lighting and the shadow of the front peg caused me to completely miss that darn third hole! Of course, my vigilant opponent did not miss it, and I lost the game because of my inattention.

How many times do you look at your "almost qualifying" score card while adding it up and see a few games lost by one

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or two points? But for those losses, you would hold a coveted qualifying spot! Spread points can make or break a qualifying card. Think of those 12/6 consolation cards, and what makes the difference between qualifying or not? Spread points!

Recently, Roy was playing in a qualifying round at a tournament and caught two opponents overpegging, for a total of five points. By catching these overpegs, he was low qualifier. Had he not had those five little points, he would have been the high nonqualifier!

Most of us know that it is sometimes difficult to stay focused when you reach the point where qualifying is impossible. This is why I like team events, because even if you can't qualify you still try to get the best possible score to add to your team's total. I believe that the most successful players not only have a superb understanding of the game, but also maintain their focus to the highest degree.

My point is to pay attention to every peg! Know what your opponent's count is and make sure they peg it accurately. Watch their pegging—and your own. If you catch a mistake, do not be afraid to call attention to it. Remember that you can correct your own overpegging if you catch it before your opponent does—except, of course, for the dreaded false claim of game!

This month's cribbage board is a replica of Northwest Native carving. The board was made by BOMA

Manufacturing Ltd. (Vancouver BC) and is based on original carvings that were done by Haida Indians. members' photos and stories about boards in this column. I try to provide a quality digital photo of the cribbage




This BOMA

board is made of resin that has been cast in a mold. The Haida people carved their pieces out of argillite, a soft, black soapstone found in the Queen Charlotte Islands. In addition to the board pictured, BOMA makes identical boards with pewter and copper castings.

Many ACC members have sent me photos of some very nice and special cribbage boards. Most recently, I received an email and photo from **Glen Cooley** (Camarillo CA), who hand-machined a brass-and-aluminum cribbage board while he was in the Navy in 1952. It is a very nice board.

board on a white background, which gives the most flexibility when converting the photo to black and white and allows it to blend into the white pages of *Cribbage World*. Standard digital cameras tend to darken a white background. That can be corrected to some degree with your computer. If you can send me photos that are in sharp focus and come close to the white background, we will do our best to use them. Otherwise, keep sending what you can because I enjoy seeing your boards and hearing your stories.

Crib Pointers

by DAVID AIKEN

n each run-up to 31, it's important that you keep your own count. Don't rely on your opponent to add the cards correctly. And when you catch an addition error, make sure you correct it before playing another card or saying "go," otherwise the incorrect announcement stands (rule 7.4).

Failure to make sure the count is correct can have major consequences when your opponent pegs, say, a 31-for-5 or 31-for-8 that otherwise wouldn't have happened with the correct count.

Tip #9 Do the Math

Here's one true-life example I witnessed where failure to keep accurate

count cost a player the game. It was the last deal of the game: the dealer needed three points to win, the pone needed 11. The pone held A-4-4-K and cut another Ace for a dozen. Here's how the endgame pegging played out (the *announced* running count is in square brackets):

pone	A [1]		K [20]		4 [27] (2 pts.)		4 [31] (8 pts.)	th
dealer	:	9 [10]		4 [23]		"go"	, , ,	ni gi

At this point it appeared that the pone gained a significant advantage by pegging 10 holes. Of course,

she didn't need any points to win the game, since the cut had already given her enough. As it turned out, this pegging brought her only to the dead hole (hole 120), and she watched in horror as the dealer now laid down 5-J for three points and pegged out.

If the count had been made correctly, here's how the pegging would have gone:

pone:	A [1]		K [20]		4 [28] (2 pts.)		(1 pt.)		4 [14]	
dealer:		9 [10]		4 [24]		"go"		J [10]		5 [19] (1 pt.)

Failure to count accurately cost this player the game, whereas an accurate count would have kept her second 4 in her hand on the second run-up to 31, thereby preventing the dealer from scoring 15-for-3 and winning the game.

Miscounting may benefit either player, and not every case of miscounting has such drastic consequences. But this much is sure: every miscount is a failure to pay attention to one of the more important aspects of the game.

Hall of Fame Nominations

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- 1. Nominations must be submitted in writing (maximum one side of a letter-size page) to the address below.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing of the ACC for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with the standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated a Bronze Award recipient or higher in the Grass Roots program.
 - d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for

- a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the board of directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- Any exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the board of directors.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by December 15.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and mail copies of each let-



ter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The voting panel will review the nominations and return their ballots to the HOF chairperson. The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National Tournament.

Youth Teaching Tip

In last month's column, I promised to provide instructions to Captain, an innovative way to play cribbage with three people. Captain matches two players against one. The lone player starts the game halfway down the board in hole 60. Some cut for deal (low card) and others honor the single player with first deal. Once the deal is determined, Captain is played like normal three-way cribbage, the only difference being that the points of the two players on the same team are combined and they move one set of pegs. Teammates may help each other count their points, but cannot share the cards that they are holding before playing them. This fun cribbage variation encourages teamwork, as the two players on the same team can play cards that help set up runs and pairs royal during the pegging process. Enjoy!

Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

I feel I must comment on what David Aiken and Jeanne Hofbauer wrote in the September *Cribbage World*. I wholeheartedly agree with both of you, and I want to share my feelings about young people playing in sanctioned tournaments.

My husband and I are raising a grandson, Ian Symons (15), a junior member who wants to play cribbage *all* the time. We've had Ian in our home since May 1996, when he was 8½ months old. At that time he suffered head trauma (from abuse by his mother) and had major skull surgery as an infant. He has a plastic plate on the right side of his head and cannot play contact sports. He does swim and bowl, but he excels in playing video games and his iPod. (Boy, can he move those fingers!)

We taught Ian to play cribbage, and last year he wanted to play in tournaments, but the local directors said no! We couldn't figure out why any director would refuse to let him play, since he plays fast and counts good. Finally, they allowed him to play the satellite events, and he has now progressed to playing in the main tournaments and consolations.

We have run across a lot of opposition from cribbage players and directors, who think young people have no business playing cribbage and winning money. Don't they realize that our youth are the future of the ACC? As you well know, the majority of our members are mostly elderly—dying off sooner than we'd like.

One tournament director told Ian he could play for points only! That didn't make sense because if Ian qualified, he should get com-



pensated for it. And the Grass Roots secretary insists on paying me (as guardian) should Ian place in the club.

On a positive note, we recently received a letter stating that Ian earned the "Rookie of the Year" award from the ACC. He scored 184 MRPs in his first full year of sanctioned pegging. What an honor! He was thrilled, and I framed the letter and hung it in his room. We are so proud of him, as we are of the fact that this year, in both April and August, he won the consolation event at Sunnyside WA, thanks to his skillful playing plus director James Morrow allowing him to play. You can imagine why this is his favorite tournament. James is an advocate for young people playing at his tournament and allowed five or six kids to play this summer.

So kudos and thanks to Dave, and Jeanne, and James—for supporting, promoting, and encouraging our young people to play the world's greatest card game for generations to come!
