My Deal

I normally start working on each issue on the 11th of the month. My goal is to deliver it to the printer by the 16th or 17th, so that the printer has time to print, collate, fold, staple, and address more than 6,000 units and then deliver them to the post office. The USPS then speeds CW on its way to you, so that by the first of the month you have in your hand all the cribbage news that's fit to print.

That's the ideal. Reality is different.


The difficulties with this issue began last fall when I booked a flight to Reno for the TOC and ACC Open. Because I wanted to attend the ACC's largest tournament, this meant I would be out of town and away from my computer during many of the days normally devoted to producing each CW. Not to worry—I figured I'd get home on Monday the 14th, immediately assume the editorial position, and hammer out the March CW by week's end.

Except that in the interval I had scheduled a one-day tourney on February 19 in Grand Rapids. My goal in doing so was to encourage club members and other local players to play weekend tourneys, and what better way to do this than on a snowy, blustery midwinter day when no sane person would do anything other than play cribbage indoors?

But more is involved than simply attending the tournament proper: (1) pretournament prep, (2) directing the tournament itself, and (3) writing up the tourney report. So #1 ended up wiping out a good chunk of last week; #2 occupied much of Friday and all of Saturday; and since I know from bitter experience that I better fill out the report while the tournament is fresh in my mind, #3 effectively eliminated Sunday from the CW schedule.

In the meantime, after arriving home from Reno, I discovered that I had failed to perform one very important task while there: I did not get the top scorecards from the four tournaments to print in CW. Not to worry: I emailed Wonder Woman (aka **Barbara Woodward**) and asked her to trudge down to the storage dungeon, rescue these scorecards, scan them, and email them at her earliest convenience. Barb graciously obliged (I think she is genetically incapable of saying no), but there were two minor problems.

First, not only was Barb enjoying her first (well-deserved) day off in two weeks, continued on page 11

Tournament Tidbits

St. Croix Classic Class is in session, and two topics are on today's lesson plan. **Lesson #1**: always check the playoff bracket before leaving. **Lesson #2**: even if you are low qualifier, you still have a chance to win the tournament. One example illustrates the truth of both lessons. **Virginia Grogan** (Saint Paul MN) qualified #29 of 29 in the Turtle Lake consolation with only an 11/5 +44 scorecard. As most players do, however, she left before checking the playoff board. Fortunately, she was eating lunch at a nearby restaurant, and a friend called her with the good news. She returned just in time to run the table against five experienced players:








Cribbage Board of the Month

poll in the February CW (pages 14–15). My original letter (December CW, page 4) proposed high rollers as a way to attract new, younger players—and I'm fairly sure not many of the people who responded to the poll were either new or younger. I certainly sympathize with those who feel that tournament costs are too high; however, all that raising the entry fee does is increase the payout—and I think players generally favor that. The TOC has the highest entry fee of any ACC tournament each year; in spite of that—and the fact that it doesn't award MRPs and it's in Reno in the middle of winter—it is probably the second or third biggest tournament of the year. So there are 500+ who don't mind the higher entry fee. I hope the idea of a high roller tournament isn't completely dead because of the poll results.






CW Contest #9 presented two challenges to readers: (a) to devise a scenario that nets the dealing team in doubles cribbage the most points, and (b) to come up with the cards that yield the lowest total points for *both* teams combined. In both cases, contestants were instructed to lay out the cards that meet these criteria, regardless of how bizarre the discards or pegging might be.

One thing we learned from this contest is that it is impossible for the dealing team to win a doubles game on a single deal. They can come close—115 points—but there seems to be no scenario that yields 121 points.

Three players submitted the correct answer, and the winning entry—chosen at random—is **James Musha** (Oshkosh WI). Here is James's 115-point hand for the dealing team (players B and D).

Each player holds 3-4-6-7 suited, with three of them having thrown a 5 to the crib (remember, we said no matter how bizarre!); one of them discarded the Jack of Diamonds, and the cut card is the 5 of Diamonds. During the pegging, the 3s go around first, then the 4s, then the 7s, and finally the 6s, like this:



This yields 59 pegging points for the dealer's team. The dealer's partner (player B) has 13 points; the dealer (D) has 14 points; and the crib is worth 29 points—for a total of 115 points!

After this heady start, it is startling to find out that the fewest combined points possible in one deal in a doubles game is—believe it or not—only 3 points! Six contestants submitted the correct answer, and **Bill Davy** (Tomah WI) is our winner. Here are the dismal hands he allotted to our players (none of the hands are flushes):

Only three points are pegged: 1 by the nondealers, and 2 by the dealing team. Alas—the starter card is a 10, so no one has any points. Alack—the crib consists of 2-8-Q-K, and so it too is worthless!





Youth Teaching Tip

I've mentioned this before, but it's important enough to talk about again-the successful teaching of pegging one's hand. This is probably the most difficult thing for young players to grasp. You need to teach kids not to play into runs that cannot be defended and, on the other side of the pendulum, to take the points for a run when they play into it. This is, by far, the part of the game where the most points are missed. My recommendation is to spend time practicing just pegging. Simply dealing four cards to each player and have them focus on pegging only, especially avoiding runs! And make sure you emphasize more than once that double runs are not honored in the pegging process.


