IT'S A WRAP!

The final weekend in July brought the 2012–2013 season to a close with a bang. Tournaments in all three regions gave the regional leaders a chance to solidify their holds on the regional championship—and an opportunity for their pursuers to close the gap. Here are some highlights from this year's MRP chase.

- **Tom Cookman** (Eureka CA) won the national championship and in the process did something that no other ACC member has ever done: he won two Master awards in the same cribbage season. Tom earned his Grand Master award (4,000 MRPs) on October 13, and he passed the 6,000-MRP mark for Life Master in late July. It looks like the awards banquet at Grand National will turn into the Tom Cookman Benefit.



- By the end of the season, the regional races weren't even close, as the three regional leaders won their respective regional championships by huge margins. In the Western Region **Tom Cookman** beat eight-time former champion **Duane Toll** by 644 MRPs. **Beth Widener** captured the Central Region crown by 549 MRPs over **Richard Frost**. And **Keith**

My Deal

By any standard you care to name, Life Master **Tom Cookman** (Eureka CA) had one helluva year.

He ran away with the national championship, beating his closest competitor—eight-time former champion Life Master (6★) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR)—by 644 MRPs. He won six tournaments—including back-to-back main tourneys at the Los Angeles doubleheader in April. Tom won two Master awards in the same cribbage season (Grand Master and Life Master Award)—the first time this has been done in ACC history. And the list goes on.

But what if I told you that another ACC member named Cookman had an *even better* cribbage year!

Lavonne Cookman (Eureka CA) started the year with 272 lifetime MRPs and earned 402 MRPs during the 2012–13 season—an increase of nearly 148%! Poor Tom, however, increased his MRP total by a meager 63.4%, having started with 3,708 MRPs and earning *only* 2,351 MRPs this season.

Need more proof that Lavonne is the better cribbage-playing Cookman? Tom

and Lavonne met in the finals of the Crescent City Open consolation on October 21, and Lavonne whipped Grand Master Tom for her first sanctioned win! This is the only time they've met in the playoffs, and Lavonne is ahead one-zip.

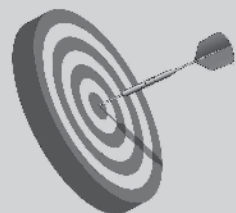
In addition, Lavonne scored two 28-hands this year compared to only one by the national champion.

One final proof of Lavonne's superiority. While traveling to Raleigh NC from their home in Eureka CA for the season finale National Open Cribbage Tournament, Lavonne and Tom carried a travel-size cribbage board on the cross-country trip. During flights and layovers, they

had time to play a full 22-game qualifying event. And Lavonne won seventeen games (four of them skunks) against the national champion, who could manage only five wins (and no skunks)!

So next time you're looking for another player for team play, and you spy two people named

Cookman across the room, which one are ya gonna ask to fill out the team roster—Lavonne or Tom? You do the math. **CW**

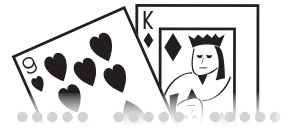

All American

For anyone who thinks you need to play fifty or more tournaments to make All American, fear not. Play well, and you can do it in thirty-five. I promise!

Paul Gregson (Antioch CA)

CW responds: this year it took 1,221 MRPs to make All American, and Paul (who finished third nationwide) had 1,240 MRPs after just *twenty* tournaments (in mid-February), so it actually took only twenty tournaments to make All American—not thirty-five! Since anyone can play twenty tournaments, what does it mean to “play well”? Here’s how well Paul played: he scored 91.2% of his MRPs in mains and earned qualifying MRPs twelve of the seventeen times he qualified in mains; and all twelve of these times he qualified in the top five!

Boosting Membership

I am responding to **Terrance Cushman** in the August CW. The ACC needs to look at how the game of bridge works through the American Contract Bridge League. In the ACBL, there is one way to become Life Master: you gain points whether you play in your home club, another club, or in tournaments. The number of points gained (and money won) increases based on the level of participation. Tournaments usually have many more participants, so you earn more points (and money) if you do well. Personally, I would play more cribbage if you could earn points no matter where you played, not just in your own club. This would increase interest

and playing time among members. This is one simple way of being innovative! Sure, some people may be able to travel more than others to get to other clubs or tournaments, but that’s just the way it is! Why hold the ability to travel against those who might want a faster way to becoming a cribbage master. While winning money is nice, the real goal is the recognition accorded to being a cribbage Master.

Standardized Payouts

It seems like nearly every tournament I go to, when it comes to prize money, I see the tournament director crunching numbers at every spare minute, trying to figure out how much to pay back. Most of the time they do a pretty good job, but every now and then they really get it screwed up. Since nearly all tournaments draw somewhere between 40 and 100 players, I would like to see the BOD come up with a schedule for every payback between 10 and 25. This should be used as a guide only. Most of the larger tournaments have this pretty well figured out and don’t need any help, and the smaller tournaments with fewer than 10 payouts are pretty easy to figure out.

Medford Lions Tale #1 The May *Cribbage World* (page 9) noted that Grand Master **Peggy Shea** (Eureka CA) had claimed yet another second-place finish—racking up ten #2s without ever winning a sanctioned event. The curse has now been lifted, as Peggy captured first place in the Medford OR main tourney. Those of you who follow sports know of the supposed “SI cover jinx”—whereby someone who appears on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* suddenly goes into a tailspin. We here in the home office of CW would like to think that Peggy is a good illustration of a “reverse SI jinx”: get your name in *Cribbage World*—and win!

Medford Lions Tale #2 In his playoff match early Sunday morning against Life Master (★) **Ira Deutsch** (San Carlos CA), Life Master (★) **Jim Crawford** (Mountain View CA) was grouching about not being able to get in the consolation. He lost the first two games to Ira, then managed to win the third, but was now in danger of missing out on the consolation if he didn't hurry up and lose quickly! Not to worry: Jim won the next two games as well and thus kept *Ira* from playing the consolation! (Minor detail: Ira had a 28-hand in the fifth game, and Jim won anyway.) Jim went all the way to the semifinals before he was eliminated from the consolation!

Cascade Classic The March 2012 *Cribbage World* (page 9) reported that Life Master (★) **Richard “Frosty” Frost** (Berlin WI) won only four of eight games at the Minnesota Snowball consolation—but that was good enough to qualify and then win the tournament. Now Master **Bruce Goff** (Tacoma WA) has done Frosty one better by winning only half of his games in a 22-game *main*. That's right, Bruce had a 28/11 scorecard! And then he went all the way to the finals on this 50% card before he lost a match. So next time you have only 11 GPs after fourteen games—think of Bruce!

Run for the Gold Life Master **Tom Langford** (McKinleyville CA) triple-dipped: he was high qualifier, main tourney winner, and—for good measure—had a 28-hand

in the fifth game of the finals!

National Open Life Master **Robert Milk** (Queen Creek AZ) had, shall we say, a superb weekend in Raleigh. He not only won the High Roller event, but he made the final four in the NOCT consolation and in the process scored *both* a 28-hand and a 29-hand!

Summer Classic Life Master **Roger Luerschow** (Maple Valley WA) had won several consolations, but never a main tourney—until, that is, CW printed his story in the August issue (page 12). But now he's added this feat to his impressive resume. The "reverse SI jinx" strikes again!

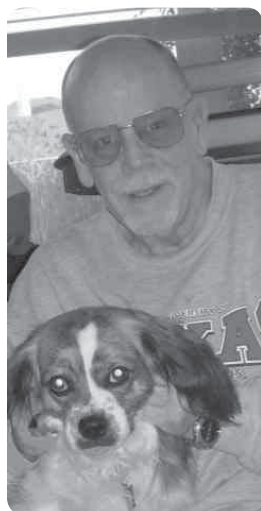

Widener bested **Bruce Sattler** by 421 points in the Eastern Region race. Both Duane and Bruce made huge runs in the last quarter of the season; in Duane's case this vaulted him from sixth to second place in the Western Region, and in Bruce's case it earned him his first appearance on the All American Team.

- For the first time ever, a wife-husband team made the All American Team in the same year. After the May 2011 shotgun wedding of **Beth Witter** to **Keith Widener**, we should have seen this coming, but what makes this event unique is that Beth continues to live in Green Bay WI and Keith in Clemmons NC, so they also captured two regional championships! In addition, this is the first time that someone with two X chromosomes won the Central Region championship.
- For the first time since the 2009–2010 season the All American Team included more than one non–Western Region player. This year's team includes two players from the Eastern Region (**Keith Widener** and **Bruce Sattler**) and one from the Central (**Beth Widener**). In addition, four players made the AAT for the first time in their cribbage careers (see page 12).
- **Keith Miller** (Waynesville NC) won the National Open, thereby making the Eastern Region Top 50 and Joe's List in one fell swoop.
- In her first full season of play, Rookie of the Year **Margaret Fanucchi** (Sebastopol CA), with 310 MRPs, edged out **Chris Leishear** (Montgomery Village MD) by 27 MRPs.

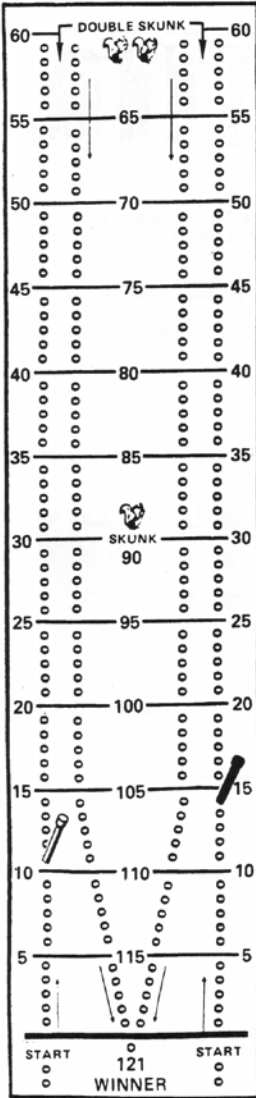
DISCARDING TIPS

Situation:

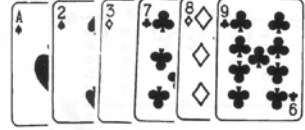
2nd hand, Jake is black standing at 15. You are white standing at 11.

Q: Am I playing offense or defense?

A: Offense. It's your crib, the game has just begun, and neither player has established a superior position.



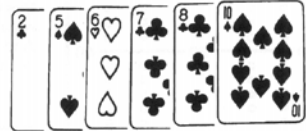
Discard the 2-king. The other alternative is the 2-10, but the king has the best chance of being discarded by Jake.



Discard the 7-8. Once again, any other discard would either weaken your hand or the crib. Make all your cards count, if possible.



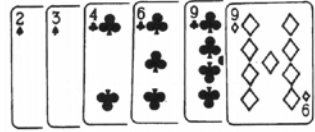
Discard the ace-king. Many players make the mistake of keeping the run of four (ace-2-3-4), discarding the 8-king. The 8-king discards weaken the crib's chances of scoring — either the 8 or king is lost. With the ace-king discard, all cards have an excellent chance of scoring. If a 2-3-4 is cut for starter, the hand counts 12 (maximum) ... and only 10 if the ace-2-3-4 is held.



Discard the 5-10. The chances of Jake discarding "ten" cards to your crib are very good. And the 2 works with your basic 6-7-8. Once again, the run of four does not always score maximum, as a 6-7-8 starter will score 14 (as will the 5 starter), but the 5-10 discard to your crib is preferable to the 2-10 discard.



Discard the queen-king. A 7-queen or king discard weakens the crib's chances of scoring. And if Jake leads a "ten" card? What an opportunity for a pegging bonanza!



Discard the 6-9 of clubs. Since it's Jake's pegging lead, the 2-3-4-9 is superior to the 2-3-4-6. The 2-9 is a better offensive-defensive combination against the "ten" card lead than is the 2-6 combination.

Cribbage Board of the Month

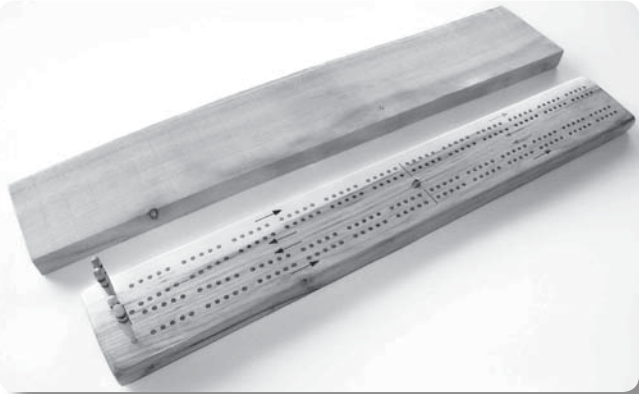

The cribbage board for this month was made by ACC member **Gary Klumpp**. Gary lives in Appleton NY and occasionally plays at Grass Roots Club 5 in Hamburg NY. Since he is a working farmer, the fifty-mile trip to play doesn't happen often. However he makes it to tournaments and his local senior center for cribbage.

In addition to playing cribbage, Gary also makes tournament cribbage boards. He specializes in boards made from many different types of wood. The board pictured here is made of hickory, and the blank piece of wood is osage orange.

After cutting the wood, Gary takes it to an Amish mill to be cut into board blanks. The blanks are stacked with lath dividers and allowed to dry for one year. After they dry, he planes, shapes, sands, drills, and finishes the cribbage board.

He also hand-carves the pegs out of the wood scraps. Gary's wife, **Susie**, makes the handy custom board/peg/card carrier.



The following is a list of different woods—most of it grown on his property—that Gary uses for his boards: hickory, osage orange, Michigan swamp oak, black walnut, ironwood, tulip poplar, sugar maple, American chestnut, red oak, ash, and cherry.

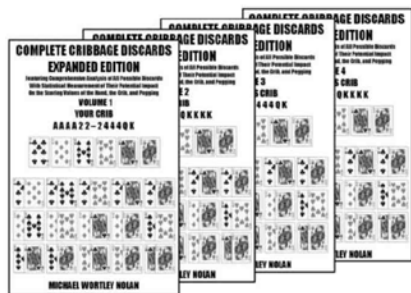

We hear from many sources that keeping our brain active as we grow older is important, so it would seem that playing cribbage is good for our health!

The decisions we make when playing a hand of cribbage are determined by several factors: board position, knowledge of your opponent, playing defense or offense, and that little inner voice that whispers something like “keep the flush.”

The most successful players are the ones that make the best decisions consistently. If you are wondering how to improve your game, I suggest that you stand behind one of those more successful players and watch their play. You should be quiet and respectful of their game and space, of course. Compare their decisions on how they keep, discard, and peg their hands to what you would do with the same cards.

Welcome to a new Grass Roots season! September is historically the peak month for new memberships. It is the responsibility of the entire club membership to welcome these new players and make them feel at home. Remember to nicely offer strategic advice without coming across as a know-it-all. Allow a probation period for new members to not be penalized for rule infractions while clearly explaining the rule to players. The bottom line is that playing competitive cribbage should be fun for all.

A new change for this season is that guests can now play four tournaments before deciding to join the ACC and Grass Roots instead of only two tournaments.

With new memberships on the rise, member retention needs to become the priority focus. Club directors should consider offering attendance incentives such as the club paying the Grass Roots fee for all members who play 50% or more of the season. My club (a Division 1 club playing 36 tournaments/season) is experimenting with a new attendance incentive this season. The club will pay the single member/single year ACC membership fee for all members who play 32 weeks or more, allowing members to miss 4 tournaments (one per quarter). Club history shows that only three to five players will qualify for this incentive. Another new incentive is that the club will pay the GRTOC tournament fee for the club champion when they attend.

Now is the time to plan your Grass Roots Regional Tournament (GRRT). The GRRT is held every season between September 1 and December 31 and is an excellent opportunity for new members to “test the tournaments waters.” This eighteen-game tournament (along with the Grass Roots National Tournament, held between January 1 and April 30) supports the Grass Roots awards program (Bronze, Silver, Gold, and other awards). Every player must be a Grass Roots member and must declare if they are playing officially or unofficially before the local GRRT/GRNT commences. You can play in as many GRRTs/GRNTs per season as you wish, but you can play officially only once per season. Playing officially enables a player to qualify for GRPs and cash prizes if they score 24 or more game points (twice that required in a standard nine-game Grass Roots tournament). Playing officially also qualifies players for cash prizes for 28-hands, 29-hands, and grand slams.

Of the 186 GR clubs in North America, 117 (62.9%) of them hosted a GRNT last season. Members of 163 clubs (87.6%, not including Travelers) played officially, leaving 23 clubs unaccounted for. Members of those 23 clubs are missing out on a great opportunity to add to their season and lifetime GRP totals. In some of those clubs, participation in GRRT and/or GRNT could affect the club champion status.

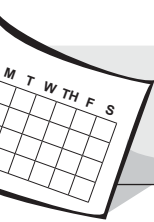
