GRNT

he results from the Grass Roots National Tournament (GRNT) are in. Congratulations to **Kurt Bloeser** (Phoenix AZ) for taking top honors with a 35/15 +273 scorecard, which included a grand slam, among 2,028 official players (including 3 junior players).

Kurt learned to play cribbage at the age of ten from his father and cribbage mentor, a navy man during WWII. He remembers beating his father eleven games in a row, a feat not to be repeated in wins or losses against any opponent since. Their trip to a Reno tournament late in his father's life was a milestone in their relationship.

Kurt joined the ACC in 1990 in Las Vegas. Family and career prevented him from playing as much as he would have liked at the time. He is now a member of Club 24 in Tempe AZ, in which he is a three-peat club champion (2009–12) and Grass Roots Division 3 champion for the same time period. He has only one tournament win to his name, St. Louis in 2010, along with a number of second and third place finishes.

Through experience, Kurt has learned that he is more successful when he doesn't play for the bomb. He qualifies for MRPs more often utilizing position play and pegging. He believes that losing is based on either lack of concentration or pure bad cards. He enjoys cribbage as a way to meet people and make friends.

My Deal by David Aiken



So what's next after GOYA? It's simple: start eating right. Activity without proper diet provides only half of what you need to control weight, become more mobile, and lengthen life.

The following suggestions are intended to help you think about food choices. As our bodies age, they need fewer calories—but they don't need fewer nutrients. So make sure you eat balanced meals that provide lots of nutrition. I hope that some of these ideas will help you do that.

- 1. Exercise daily. The first step in controlling weight is exercise. See last month's column.
- Don't snack. Most of us already eat too much, so discipline yourself to eat only at meal time. Trust me: you'll still get all the food you need.
- 3. Eat fruit or cereal for breakfast. With lots of natural, wholesome foods that provide all the nutrition you need, you needn't indulge in processed foods first thing in the morning to feel full.
- 4. Eat green salad for lunch. Call it rabbit food if you like, but you'll feel better during the afternoon if you eat sensibly at lunchtime.
- 5. Eat one helping at supper. While eat-

- ing the right kinds of food is important, portion control is the number one way to control weight.
- 6. Eat dessert once a week. Cutting out most of the sweets we consume (including carbonated beverages) will improve all kinds of health issues—especially type 2 diabetes. A note to tournament directors: provide fruit instead of donuts.
- Don't eat at buffets or all-you-can-eat restaurants as it's too easy to overindulge.
- 8. Don't eat directly from the container; dish out a reasonable portion onto your plate.
- 9. Don't eat within three hours of bedtime. Give your body time to burn the energy it consumes before you hit the sack.
- Eat slowly, so you don't take in extra calories after you're full. This will also give you time to enjoy dinner conversations.

Please adopt the suggestions that work for you. My wish for all of us is that exercise and proper diet will increase our fitness, lengthen our lives, and add to the enjoyment of life—and cribbage. CW

The top five finishers are a testament to how important every peg point is. Only two peg points behind Kurt was **Arthur Spindler** (Club 218 in Gladstone MI) with 35/15 +271. Third place was secured by **Gerald Gruber** (Club 240 in St. Paul MN) with 33/16 +251. Only three peg points separated fourth and fifth place: **Andy Wagner** (Club 58 in Raleigh NC) had 33/15 +210, while **Don Pearson** (Club 238 in Casper WY) had 33/15 +207.

One note of interest is that fourth-place finisher Andy Wagner was a first-time entrant in the GRNT. He is a twenty-one-year-old graduate of North Carolina State and had never heard of the ACC prior to joining Club 58 last August. In his first Grass Roots season, he secured second place in the club with 213 GRPs among twenty-two members, which include seven Silvers and five Bronzes. WTG Andy!

Congratulations to the 430 official players (21.2%) who scored 24 or more game points and won a share of the \$18,357 awarded. Congratulations also to the 43 award winners sharing \$1,075 who were able to score a 28-hand (30) or a grand slam (13). There were no 29-point hands this year.

While some clubs hold their GRNT just like a double club tournament, other clubs make it like an ACC-sanctioned tournament by inviting visitors from local clubs. An honorable mention goes to five clubs that had forty or more participants:

Of the 186 clubs in North America, 114 (61.2%) of them hosted a GRNT. Members of 152 clubs (including Travelers) played officially, leaving 34 clubs unaccounted for. Members of those clubs are missing out on a great opportunity to add to their seasonal and lifetime Grass Roots point totals. In some of those clubs, participation in GRRT and/or GRNT could affect who the club champion is.

Thanks to **Bob Joslin** (Lakeville MN) for another fine job of directing the tournament, which includes but is not limited to collecting and verifying all of the tournament reports from the 114 clubs that hosted a GRNT, entering the results into the Grass Roots website, and getting checks in the mail when all was finished. Thanks also to all club directors who held a GRNT. The eighteen-game format is separate from the scheduled club tournaments, which requires extra planning and at least a few volunteers to help pull it off.


The GRRT (Grass Roots Regional Tournament; held every year between September 1 and December 31) and GRNT are excellent opportunities for club members to test the tournaments waters. As most of you already know, these eighteen-game tournaments are fundraisers held to support the Grass Roots awards program (Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, and other awards). Every player must be a Grass Roots member and must declare if they are playing officially or unofficially



Youth Teaching Tip

When teaching the pegging part of the game, please don't overlook some common rules regarding runs that may be confusing to beginners. A good example of this is to note that a run can be continued as long as the last three (or more) cards played make a run. For instance if 3-4-2 has been played and the next player lays a 3, another run of three may be counted. In this instance, it is also important to point out that double runs are not counted in the pegging process. Many adults who are just learning cribbage contact me with uncertainties about this part of the game. If adults are confused, imagine that the same would hold true for your young students.

This board belonged to an airman named Kane, whose name and serial number are still on the board. However, Airman Kane bet the board on a cribbage game and Patricia's dad won it.

After the war, Patricia's dad returned to Minnesota with the board. The only war story her dad would tell were cribbage stories. Like many combat veterans, Airman Ruble did not like to discuss his wartime experiences.



a kind. Only four quads can turn into 24 points with the right cut card:

Rather than waste time during a game counting these hands, simply memorize the list.
