MRPs for Everyone!

he BOD voted at its September meeting in Phoenix AZ to award qualifying MRPs to everyone who qualifies for playoffs in all sanctioned events.

The current point system awards qualifying MRPs to only the top half of the qualifiers (or one-eighth of the field). If you fall within this group, you currently earn 5 MRPs for a 27 card in the main, 10 for a 28 card, and so on. The point values for consolation scorecards are 3 MRPs for a 12, 6 for a 13, etc.

The new point system will award 5 MRPs to the lower half of qualifiers in the main event and 3 MRPs in the consolation. The sliding scale will then kick in for the top half of the qualifiers, beginning at 27 points for mains and 12 for consolations.

According to the proposal's principal sponsor, BOD member **Richard Frost** (Berlin WI), this new system will help even the playing field for all ACC members and will "garner more enthusiasm, retain and possibly gain new members, and increase participation at ACC tournaments."

The proposal passed 20–3 and will be implemented at the start of the next cribbage season, on August 1, with this caveat: new software (currently under development) must be in place in order to accommodate this change in recording points. If the software is not fully in place by August 1, 2015, then this proposal will be delayed until the following year.

My Deal



Play smart, play fair, play fast.

Many new players attend Grass Roots clubs because they know a current member, or because they heard about it from a friend of a friend. Some players find us online.

But I'm convinced that there are thousands of cribbage players all around the country who have never heard of the ACC, and we need to figure out a way to reach them.

One surefire way to make contact with these players is to hold club in a public venue. If your Grass Roots club plays in a bar, restaurant, lodge, bookstore, or anywhere that the public has access to and can see the club playing when they walk through—then you have an advantage that other clubs do not, because of the exposure this gives your club.

This little trick will almost certainly increase club membership, because sooner or later someone who loves the game as much as we do will wander through or by your playing area and think: Wow, I love that game; it sure would be fun to play cribbage again!

I know from personal experience that playing where the public can see what is happening will increase membership. My home club, Square Peggers Club 91 in Grand Rapids MI, has experienced its greatest growth when we play in restaurants in plain view of other diners.

It also helps to put up a sign in the public venue. Here's an example of such a sign, suggested by **Max Steplyk** (Pleasant Prairie WI) of Kenosha Cribbage Club 197:

If one family member needs the game to qualify, there will be an inordinate amount of scrutiny placed on that player. Why place anyone in that position where they have to defend themselves? I would also add that it appears that those who argue the most for the "total random draw" are the ones who don't have a family member playing, and therefore, no money comes out of the same pot. The BOD needs to address this issue in the Tournament Director's Manual so we at least have some direction on this issue.

If You Haven't Got Your Health ... BY ARLENE CARLE th Street

Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

We've enjoyed the CW commentary on making good decisions to maintain health through nutrition, exercise, and good sleep habits. Even so, things go wrong. For Hank, it was his heart, and all of the doctor appointments, all of the tests, all of the prescriptions did not stop the long, five-year decline.

In December, Hank's doctor told him he had a frozen aortic valve and pulmonary hypertension. Either could make him drop dead at any moment; she referred him to hospice and sent him home to die.

We consulted a local surgeon, waited for an opinion from the University of Washington Medical Center, sent his records to Cleveland Heart Institute, and canceled our flight to Reno for the JPW/ACC Open in February—the first time we had missed in over twenty-five years.

The surgeon said open-heart surgery was risky, and he would not attempt it. The University of Washington agreed with hospice referral. We had several conversations with Cleveland Heart Institute and told them if they had anything to offer we would get on a plane and come back. If they had nothing to offer, we didn't want to make the trip.

They called us to come back in March. When we went, Hank was the top Grass Roots scorer in the country. He was also in a wheelchair and on oxygen 24/7. Cleveland is an amazing institute. They have been number one in cardiac care for the last twenty consecutive years. When we

got there, they did two days of tests and then had Hank in surgery, which they called a procedure. It took three and a half hours to do a balloon angioplasty of the aortic valve, using a 1,600-rpm drill to remove a calcium deposit in his aortic artery and put a stent in—and Hank was awake the whole time. When it was over, Hank was off of oxygen except at high altitudes for the first time in almost a year.

We went back home to Anchorage to wait for the FDA to approve the aortic valve that could be inserted through a leg artery. We returned to Cleveland in July, and on July 22 Hank got a new aortic valve (well, it was used previously by a cow; I say a bull but it was really a cow). On August 6 the doctor put two clips on the mitral valve to stop the leakage, and after the post-op check ten days later, when we returned to Anchorage, Hank was off oxygen, was off a bunch of medications, was walking on his own, had his appetite back, was sleeping well, and had his color and sense of humor back. Besides good nutrition, smart exercise, and good sleep, we found you must also be proactive in decisions for your own medical care.

At home, Hank's cribbage friends told him they let him have the club championship this season only because he was so pitiful, but that he should not expect that kind of treatment this year. We already have our flight reservations for Reno in February! CW

Cribbage Board of the Month

This board belongs to ACC member **Bud Ferrigno** (Canby OR). I met Bud several years ago in Reno. He told me about his board, and I hoped to see it one day. Last September I attended the Cribbage Board Collectors Society Convention in Portland OR. Bud came to visit our convention and brought his board. CBCS members were as excited to see this board as Bud was to see the many beautiful and unique boards we had on display.



Every board has a story, and this board is no exception. It was hand-crafted by Bud's great-grandfather, **Charles Sullivan**. Charles was one of the principal founders of the timber town Mill City OR in 1886, on the western slopes of the Cascade Mountains east of Salem. He probably made the board around 1920 from native woods around Mill City. It includes Douglas fir, cedar, pine, maple, and mahogany. There is stor-

age for cards, pegs, cigarettes, and matches. The most unusual part of the board is a built-in ashtray. The metal bottom of the ashtray flips and dumps the ashes and butts into a metal drawer that can be emptied as needed.

Bud found the ACC when he read about the 1985 Oregon State Championships in Prineville OR. He attended, and his family history of cribbage served him well because he made the playoffs. Cribbage is definitely a family affair for Bud. In the late 1980s, his father, brother, and son all played together in a few tournaments. At age eleven, his son qualified for the playoffs in the Cascade Classic. His son lost 3-1 in the playoffs Sunday morning to an opponent who was a "true gentleman"—**DeLynn Colvert**.

Some of you might run into Bud at future ACC tournaments. He is within 100 points of his Grand Master rating. He also plays Grass Roots

cribbage in Club 191, the Canby Diehards, and is working toward his Gold Award. Good luck Bud! CW

- Election of executive officers: Jeanne Hofbauer (president), Todd Schaefer (executive VP), and David Campbell (VP-operations) were reelected unopposed. 

Youth Teaching Tip

It's the morning of your big youth cribbage tournament. The room is buzzing with excitement as the kids can hardly wait for the cards to be passed out. But as the morning progresses, you sense some frustration and loss of enthusiasm in those who have lost their first three games. This is not good, as the last thing you want to do is curb the joy of cribbage for a young player. Here are some suggestions for directors to implement, so all players feel like winners regardless of their scorecards:

- Hand out raffle tickets to anyone scoring a sixteen-point hand or better. At lunchtime draw tickets and hand out prizes (they don't have to be elaborate prizes; the more stuff, the more winners).
- Have a cribbage store with prizes (candy bars, gift cards, custom pegs, recycled cribbage boards, etc.) that kids can buy with tickets (different from the raffle tickets). Kids get a store ticket every time they get nobs or heels.
- Award the last 24-hand of the tournament with a special prize.
- Keep plenty of fun protein snacks and drinks available to keep their energy up.
- Conduct a short consolation event after lunch to give kids a second chance

The bottom line is that if kids walk away with an armload of prizes, they will feel like winners and most likely come back to your next tournament.

A 17th-century British poet made cribbage popular in English courts, where he distributed packs of marked cards to the aristocracy, inevitably beat them out of tidy sums, and managed to gamble his way to a \$7 million contribution to King Charles I's army."

Forfeiting a Game

Many times two players in the final game of a tournament have both already been eliminated from qualifying or cashing, and so their final game ends up being meaningless. If one or both of them wants to hit the road, they will frequently "cut for the win." In the past, this has been rather unofficial, but the three regional tournament commissioners (**Patrick Barrett**, **David Campbell**, and **Roy Hofbauer**), in consultation with the chair of the Ethics Committee (**Ron Logan**) and the ACC's VP-Policy (**Keith Widener**), have now formulated a policy to clarify how to handle these situations. Here is the official ACC policy:

Two players may agree to forfeit the *final* game of an ACC sanctioned or satellite tournament with the following action taken: upon agreement, *both* players must contact the tournament director in advance of any recorded score. The forfeited games on *both* scorecards will be recorded as 0 in the game points column and –10 in the negative spread column. The tournament director will initial both scorecards. Under no circumstances can either player forfeit if their card is a possible qualifying card for the playoffs or payoff of that event. This rule does not apply to Grass Roots play.

Note: the *only* game that can be forfeited in a qualifying round is the *final* game of the tournament. For procedures related to forfeited games in a playoff match, see rule 12.2 in the 2010 rulebook. Rule 8.11d covers conceding a game in a playoff match. Questions about this policy can be directed to the tournament commissioners.



So you missed club for a week or two because you were on vacation, traveling for work, or your team was playing in the World Series (as in my case). Do you want to see what you missed in club while you were away? Easy! Just go to the Grass Roots website at accarassroots.org.

Start by personalizing the site just for you. In the field at the top of the page, enter your ACC number (using leading zeroes after the state to create a seven-character format; for example, MT00001 instead of MT1). It should respond with "Welcome [first name]." Once personalized, your club becomes the default for all results and stats. requested. Click on the "Results" link and then the "Club" link. The most recent tournament entered will be displayed. Select any prior tournament; if you correctly personalized the site, your results for tourneys that you participated in will be highlighted. By clicking on the "Standings" link (select "Unofficial" to include tournament results that have been entered by the club statistician but yet to be posted by the regional statistician), your name will be highlighted, indicating where you stand in the club. Finally, see every tournament that you have played in this season just by clicking on your name. Did you transfer from another club or do you have a friend in another club that you have challenged? Select any other club to see the results of their tournaments.

Club statisticians should not use this as an

alternative to providing hard copy tournament results and stats at each



club tournament. The standard reports of club statistics available in the admin section are not all available by this means. Also, not all club members have internet access, and of those that do, not all of them are savvy enough to find what they are looking for (although Paul Gregson has made the Grass Roots website very intuitive). Keep the competitive spirit alive in club by printing and providing all of the club reports for each tournament played.

Kissimmee Club 341(Kissimmee FL) things are certainly different this year. Last year we had one 28-hand. This year we have had three 28-hands in only six weeks of play: on September 10, September 24, and October 8! submitted by Ray Wanke

Chippewa Valley Cribbage Club 284 (Eau Claire WI)—Trick or treat came very early in October, as on 10-1-14, we had twenty-one players and eleven received GRPs.
