President's Column

Ask Ivan! One day you wake up and decide: we need a Grass Roots club in our area. Maybe it's another club within the same city but at a different day/time to draw attention to retirees who can't drive at night or to folks who work during the weekdays; or maybe there isn't a club within an hour's drive. Whatever your reason, you ask: "James? How do I start this?"

And I say, "Go ask Ivan!"

In all seriousness, we have great resources on our website *but* the first thing on your list should be to find six players to attend your club. Then you need to decide if you want to play six games at club or nine. There are benefits to both. Find a venue that suits your needs. If you are starting with six players, the venue doesn't need to be large. It could even begin at someone's house!

If you are using a restaurant or place of business that serves food or beverages, let them know that having an event in their facility will be a win-win situation, as cribbage players like to eat and have beverages.

Now that you have a place to play and six or more players, look in the area for a newspaper that lists local weekly events. Normally they are free, and the internet has several options, from Facebook to Meet Up. But be prepared to grow as people see the ads you put in your local paper, on local community boards, at your local senior center, or even on social media. The summer months are the best time to bring new players into organized cribbage. It is the time to help them with their game play and get used to the ACC format. The official Grass Roots season is September 1 to May 31, when a player can earn points toward becoming the best player of their club and start earning their Bronze Award.

Now it's time to gather some playing cards and long boards. Printable scorecards are available on the Grass Roots website, and if you have trouble finding long boards, contact **Ivan Wells** for real this time.

The most important question remains: what will your new club be named? If you have more questions or want to discuss whether or not it is time to start your own, I am always available by email at **the29seeker@yahoo.com**.

At the upcoming Grand National in Deadwood SD in October, the BOD will award the Central Region's next Grand National, scheduled for 2028. ACC members interested in hosting this event must inform Executive VP Rick Shea (31for14@gmail.com) of their interest by August 31. Detailed information is not necessary at this time; a general plan is sufficient to consider the bid.



Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

One point! Sometimes a single point is all that separates victory from defeat. In two recent tournaments, I encountered both the nadir and the zenith of cribbage.

Kat Hartsell reported in the January *Cribbage World* (page 38) how she beat me by one point in the final game of the Grand National midweek main. That win would have qualified me with a 28-point scorecard and, who knows, maybe I would've won it!

Three month later, I was playing in the Rod Hovey Memorial in Kalamazoo MI. This was a brand new tourney in honor of longtime ACC member and club director **Rod Hovey**, and I was excited to be there along with eighteen clubmates.

I started well, with a skunk and a win. But then I managed to lose five games in a row, virtually sinking my chances of qualifying in a twelve-game tourney.

Sidenote for everyone who says never start a tournament with a skunk: keep reading!

I won games eight and nine, but in game ten I faced a familiar foe—clubmate **Jerri Halicki**. Jerri held eight of the ten points she needed, and I managed to keep her on the board. Between hand and crib, I had enough points to seal a one-point victory.

I won my last two games, turned in a 15/7 +51 scorecard, and then waited to find out if I qualified.

Good news: I qualified (second from the bottom)! Bad news: I would face Jerri in the first round! To paraphrase Forrest Gump: I know what revenge is, so I was expecting a beatdown. Instead I got much better cards than Jerri did. And then I did the same thing against my next three opponents. And then I won the tourney!

Long story short: if I don't win the one-point game against Jerri, I don't even qualify for the playoffs—just as one point kept me out of the GN midweek. Moral

Multigenerational Cribbage • by Melissa Bierenga

One of my duties as a school librarian is to offer extracurricular activities that help students learn new skills. My personal goal is to do so while connecting them with different generations. It is important to me that students are part of a community that is of varying ages but with common interests.

I have offered many clubs before—Origami Club, Lego Club, Poetry Club—but many students had never heard of cribbage. My husband and I play every night, so I thought that Cribbage Club would be the perfect way to introduce students

to an old game that involves so many mathematical concepts.

I planned an after-school club that would take place over six weeks in 2023. The first few weeks would involve learning the basics of the game, and the last few weeks would allow for competition between students. Fourteen students signed up, and I started teaching them the basics.

I wondered if there was a group of seasoned players who could play against us on our last week, so I googled "cribbage league in Kalamazoo" and a random name popped up: **Rod Hovey**. [*Editor's note: see March 2024 Cribbage World, pages 6–7.*] I sent an email wondering if his club would be interested in meeting up for a tournament. He was thrilled to be able to help, so we planned a tournament in December 2023.

Ten players came from Kalamazoo Club 321 to our school's library, ♣ and students had one hour to play against as many seasoned players as possible. I will never forget the first question one of Rod's club members asked me: "Do we have to be nice?" I responded: "Absolutely not!" The students were pretty confident in their skills . . . but Rod's crew showed them that they had a lot to learn.

It was an incredible opportunity for our students. When we offered Cribbage Club a second time, eighteen students joined, and we had just as much fun playing against Rod's club for our second tournament. We are hopeful that this can be an ongoing partnership between Kalamazoo Christian students and Club 321 members.

For me, my school's Cribbage Club is so much more than teaching students cribbage. It is about bringing two different generations together to share common interests, to learn from one another, and to spend quality (screenless) time together. I believe that this is what God wants our communities to look like, and I will forever be grateful to Rod for replying to my email and helping me build this multigenerational community.

Editor's note: Melissa is the media center and academic enrichment coordinator at Kalamazoo Christian Elementary/Middle School. I met her at the Rod Hovey Memorial in Kalamazoo MI on February 8, when we played in the last game of the main. When she told me why she was playing her very first tournament that day,

I asked her to write up the story because I wanted ACC players to know (a) how important multigenerational cribbage is and (b) how valuable a role ACC members can serve in cribbage settings outside of clubs and tournaments. We need more Melissas—and more Rods—in our organization!


at Beer City Peggers Club 71 in Grand Rapids MI until I retired in 2015. Then we hit the road, traveling the whole

Scott's Peek at the Past

It's time to vote for the American Cribbage Congress Board of Directors. Please exercise your right and vote for the directors who will shape the policies and operate the ACC for the next two years.

The first board of directors was appointed by Founding Father/President **Joseph Petrus Wergin**, along with assistance from the Executive Committee. A twenty-six-member board of directors was named after the organizational meeting of the Congress in August 1979 in Raleigh NC.

The original constitution of the ACC called for the first election of the board of directors to be held in the summer of 1981. The top twenty-five vote-getters were elected to the BOD. The top twelve vote-getters received a two-year term, and the next thirteen got a one-year term. That method of alternating twelve and thirteen board members continued for the next seven elections until the summer of 1989. For a time, the president appointed up to five directors to reach a maximum of thirty BOD members.

The board of directors then decided on a cost-cutting and time-saving method of all twenty-five directors for a two-year term. This method of voting for the BOD began in 1989 and has continued in every odd year since then, leading to the election this year. I wrote in greater detail about the early election process in my May 2024 column. For this year, it was time for me to do some research. I got out all my *Cribbage World* election issues, and it turns out that 151 people have served at least one year as a board member for the Congress.

Jeff Shimp (MI) was appointed to the original board of directors back in 1979 when the ACC was formed. Shimp then served forty-plus years on the board, before being named Board Member Emeritus a few years ago. Not far behind in years on the board is **Patrick Barrett** (WI). Pat was first elected to the BOD in 1993 and has been reelected ever since, for a total of thirty-two years. Thanks, Jeff and Patrick, for all that service to the ACC.

Forty-one people have served at least ten years on the board. Det's pay tribute to these folks, who have been very important to the history and operation of the ACC.

Thanks to all these people for your service. Please vote!

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

The Starter Card

Sometimes the simplest things can cause confusion. Cutting for the starter card and what to do with it is an example.

Rule 3.1.c states: When cutting before each deal and for the starter card, no less than four cards shall be taken from the top and no less than four left on the bottom. There has to be a limit placed so that the cut isn't easily manipulated. It has to be a fair cut.

Then there is a whole section—rule 6—solely about the starter card. Rule 6.1.a states that only after both players discard to the crib shall the pack be cut by the pone. I have covered this before. Do not precut! Rule 6.1.b states: The pone shall not look at the bottom card of the upper pack when making the cut. Keep that card hidden. Rule 6.1.c states: If the card is placed in the dealer's hand and is not seen by the pone, there will be a two-point penalty. The pone blindly removes two cards from the dealer's hand, looks at them, and selects either one as the starter card.

The other card is returned to the dealer's hand, and play continues.

If this isn't enough, rule 9.3 deals strictly with the starter card. Most notably, rule 9.3.a states: The starter card must remain segregated from the hands and crib while they are being counted and scored. The action of mixing the starter card with your hand or crib carries a two-point penalty. We are all guilty of doing this sometimes, especially when counting the crib, and most of the time it is just a harmless action. But if you are doing this, it is not a good practice and you need to stop.

Now before I get lots of emails about this, let me clarify a little. If you are holding the starter card in one hand but not releasing it into the hand or the crib, that does not constitute mixing the starter card with the hand or the crib. The card has to be released and mixed with the hand or crib to violate this rule.

So everybody please play nice, and always have fun.

BOD ELECTION

Every odd-numbered year the ACC holds an election for its 25-member Board of Directors. The next two-year term of office begins on September 1, 2025, and runs through August 31, 2027. Per the ACC Policy Manual, only members who are current when the mailing list is prepared and aged 18 or above are eligible to vote (i.e., expired members cannot vote). Joint members will receive separate issues of this *Cribbage World* so that each eligible voter has their own ballot and unique code.

The preferred method of voting is online at **cribbage.org** but mail is also acceptable. Each eligible voter has been issued a random four-digit alphanumeric code that *must* be used when voting. Located by your name and ACC number on the back of this magazine, your code is used to gain access to the online ballot. It must also be written on mailed-in ballots. Ballots must be mailed separately; no group mailings will be accepted.

This year thirty-one candidates are running for election to the BOD. Each region must have between six and ten directors, and no state may have more than four.

Candidate biographies and photos (presented in random order) are printed on the next few pages. Please read these bios carefully, for they contain statements by the candidates about their qualifications, cribbage accomplishments, contributions to the ACC, and policies they plan to enact or have already enacted.

After reading the biographies, please vote for the candidates of your choice.

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





You are dealing from three out, and your opponent needs eight with his first count. You have 7-8-9-Q-Q-K; what's your hold?

Obviously this is not an ideal hand for end-game pegging: you have no low cards, no magic elevens, and no five—so what can you hold to maximize your defenses here? My first thought is to keep 7-9-Q-Q; if the pone has a low-card hand such as 2-3-3-4 or 3-3-4-5, you can play your 7 and 9 (these also cover all middle card leads) and then run the Queens for three at the end. But what if the pone leads a K? I like the 9 response here: you can tempt him to dump a 5. Obviously I don't have a 5 and he could think I'm more likely to have a 2 to complete the magic 11 with the 9 instead of a 7.

I actually got very lucky in this scenario. The pone had 5-10-10-K, so after the first go, I led the 7 to start the second series. The pone was scared to put a 5 on it as a 3 or 6 would beat him, so I got a go and 15-for-3 with my last Queen.

So do not fret if you get dealt subpar pegging cards at the end. Formulate a plan and see it through. You just may get rewarded.




